Select "FASTPLAY" Enter PIN</p>	<p>ART: To make bunny ears, draw large bunny ears in the center of a paper plate. Cut the middle out but leave the ears attached. Fold them up and wear as a crown. Practice vocabulary and color/decorate the ears.</p>	<p>Use your Boom Cards to Practice: Silly Face, Silly Face, What Do You See? PIN: Look on social media for PIN or text your clinician</p>	<p>Painting: Decorate and paint some Easter eggs. Get creative and use stickers, markers, paint, and have fun! Practice colors, shapes, and vocabulary.</p>	<p>Egg Hunt: Hide eggs all over your house or outside. Have your child count how many they found. Instead of candy, on a piece of paper, add some written verbs inside the eggs. Have your child act out the verbs. Ex: hop like a bunny</p>
<p>Emotions 1: watch a video on Kids YouTube about emotions. Talk about the different emotions and practice making faces of the different emotions.</p>	<p>YouTube: Watch an ASL (American Sign Language) video for kids based on colors. Practice the colors, say them out loud and use Sign Language at the same time.</p>	<p>Use your Boom Cards to Practice: Color Match- ASL Signs. PIN: Look on social media for PIN or text your clinician</p>	<p>Egg Tower- Have your child build a tower with plastic easter eggs by stacking the halves on top of each other. Practice colors, numbers, big/tall, small/short, more, oh, oh fell down!</p>	<p>Easter bunny's house- Use crackers to build a house for the Easter Bunny! Use Pinterest for ideas. Practice vocabulary and talk about the process and what you will need.</p>	<p>ART: Use the halves of the plastic easter eggs to create stamps with paint. On a piece of paper, dip the halves of the eggs and decorate the whole paper using different colors. Practice the colors and shape (circle). Also use words like dip, push, more.</p>	<p>Peek-A-Boo: On a piece of paper, draw an egg cracked through the middle and a little chick's head. Color them and cut them out. Using a clothes pin, glue the two halves of the egg on the top and bottom. Add the chick to the bottom half. Practice Peek-a-boo-open/shut.</p>
<p>Recycled Car: Using an empty toilet paper roll, cut out a semi-circle on the top of the roll. Glue 4 bottle lids on the sides as the tires. Decorate and let dry. Talk about the process and what you will need. Practice the vocabulary.</p>	<p>Emotions 2: When an opportunity presents itself, talk to your child about the emotion they are feeling. Try to talk about each emotion such as anger, sadness, happy, and fear. You can take a picture of their emotion so they can see themselves afterwards.</p>	<p>Sensory bin: Fill ¼ of a plastic bin with dry rice or beans. Add recycled materials such as toilet paper rolls, paper towel rolls, egg carton, water bottles, small plastic shovels. Practice words like pour, in, out, full, more.</p>	<p>Tree Art: Paint the bottom of an egg carton green. Once it is dry, cut them out individually. On a piece of paper, draw and color a tree trunk, then glue the green egg carton pieces to complete the tree. Practice vocabulary.</p>	<p>Recycle: Teach your child how to recycle, describe plastic, cardboard and aluminum. Allow them to help you sort them out.</p>	<p>Get Creative: use different size cardboard boxes to create a city. Use cereal boxes to stack on each other and create a bridge for cars. Use Pinterest for ideas. Practice vocabulary and sounds like vroom, beep beep.</p>	<p>Use your Boom Cards to Practice: Color sorting PIN: Look on social media for PIN or text your clinician</p>
<p>Music and Movement: Let's make Maracas! Use a plastic egg and fill it with dry rice or beans. Secure it shut with tape. Get two plastic spoons and place the egg between the spoons. Tape the top and the bottom handle to secure them together. Dance and sing to your favorite song.</p>	<p>Read a book: Look for a book on animals in the spring. Read it together and label the animals. Go outside and look for some of those animals (birds, butterflies, lizards, rabbits, squirrels) or draw a picture of your favorite spring animals. Practice animal motions and sounds.</p>	<p>Emotions 3: Help your child draw a picture of when they were feeling happy, sad, angry or scared. Talk about that event</p>	<p>Use your Boom Cards to Practice: Spring Vocabulary Sensory Bin PIN: Look on social media for PIN or text your clinician.</p>	<p>Bird Feeder: Using a milk jug or juice carton, cut out a large opening on both sides. Decorate and paint it. Tie a rope or yarn to the bird feeder to hang outside. Add the bird seeds. Wait for birds to come and talk about what you see!</p>	<p>Music and Movement: Watch on YouTube, "The Sleeping Bunnies" song. Dance along and follow the words. Use the maracas you made</p>	<p>Color Scavenger Hunt: On a piece of white paper draw a square for each color of the rainbow. Find different objects to match the colors. Take a picture. Practice names of the objects and colors. Ex: red square= red flower from the garden.</p>
<p>Review Boom Cards: Pick the Boom Cards that your child had the most difficulty with and review them.</p>	<p>Review: Practice the colors in American Sign Language.</p>	<p>Drawing: Draw a picture of your plant that you planted last month. Review what plants need to grow. Talk about how it looks and how its grown.</p>	<p>Use your Boom Cards to Practice: Silly Face, Silly Face, What Do You See? PIN: Look on social media for PIN or text your clinician</p>	<p>Emotions 4- When the opportunity arises, ask your child if he is mad, happy, sad or scared.
